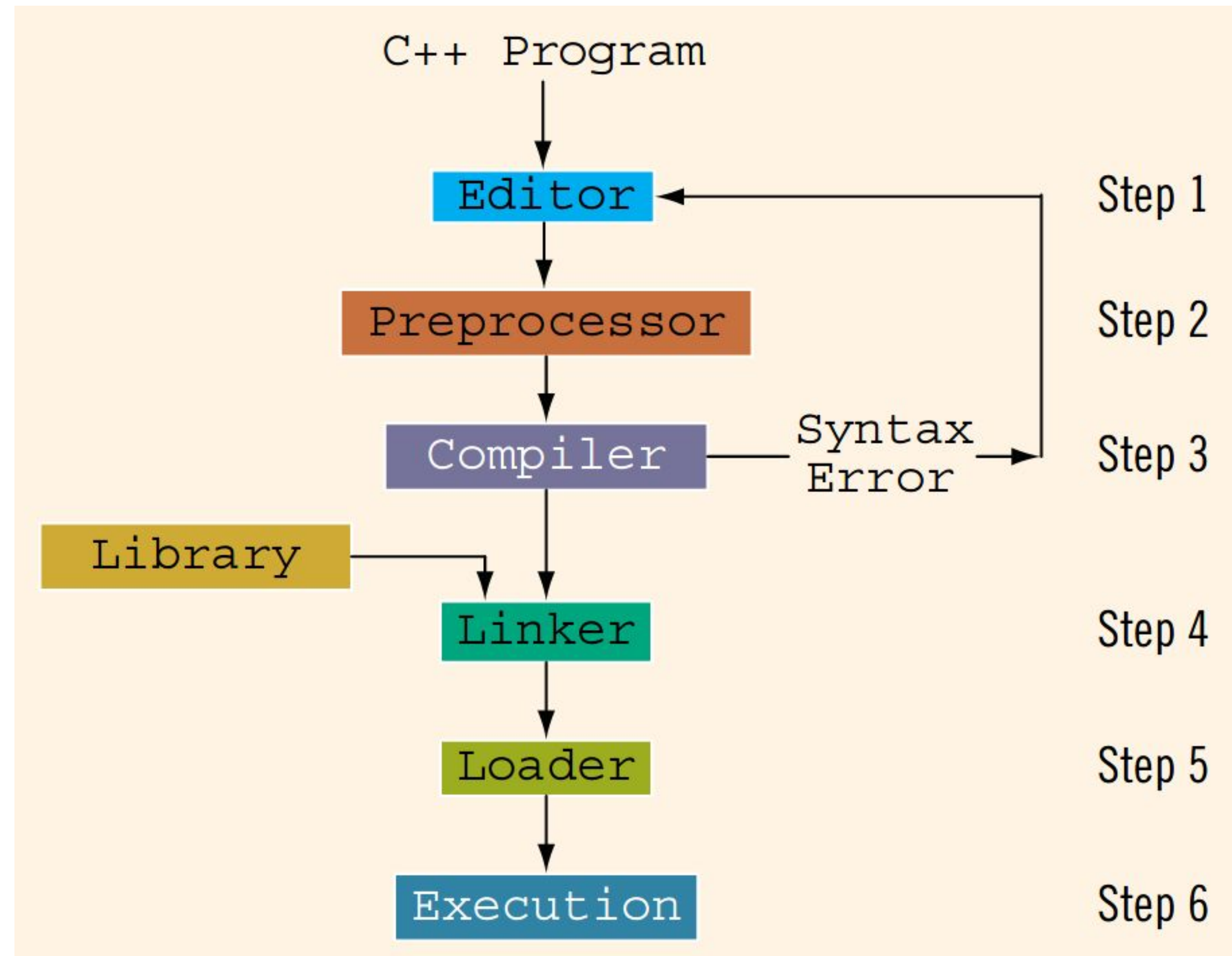
# Program of the tutorial

# Very simple C++ program

## Demonstration

```
#include <iostream>
#include <string>
using namespace std;
int main(){
    string answer;
    cout<<"Please answer yes or no"<<endl;
    cin>>answer;
    if(answer=="yes") cout<<"Hello world"<<endl;
    return 0;
}
```

Include C++ libraries. Give you access to *cout*, *cin* functions and to *string* data type

Create variable of type *string* called *answer*

Print sentence to terminal

The user must type an answer (yes or no) in the terminal. The value will be stored in the *answer* variable

If the user answers "yes" the program prints "Hello world" to the terminal
